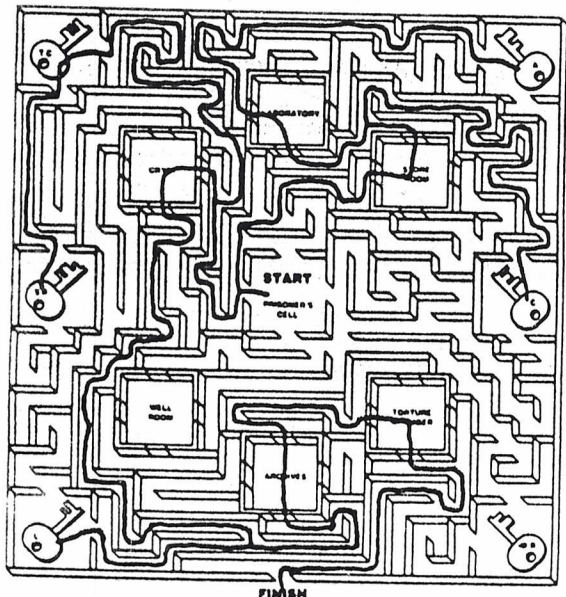

PRESIDENT ABRAHAM LINCOLN MAKES APPEARANCE AT MBS

On Tuesday evening, June 12, 1989, an excellent portrayal of Abraham Lincoln was presented to the citizens at the evening assembly. The portrayal was presented by James Dague, and the audience was spellbound at James' reading of the Gettysburg Address. We are looking forward to his rendition of Lincoln's Farewell Address to the citizens of Springfield Thursday. The hat he wears in his portrayal of Lincoln was given to him two years ago by A. James Manchin two years ago when Mr. Manchin visited Boys' State and spoke to the citizens.

James lives in Tridelfia with his parents, Edward and Patty Dague. He graduated from Wheeling Park High School in 1988. He was a citizen of Mountaineer Boys' State in 1987 and has returned for two consecutive years as a Junior Counselor in Panhandle Cottage where he was a citizen in 1987.

James attends West Virginia Northern Community College in Wheeling, where he is majoring in Liberal Arts. He hopes to pursue an A.B. degree in Political Science or Education. In addition to his studies, James portrays Lincoln in talent and variety shows, and to 4-H and other civic groups.

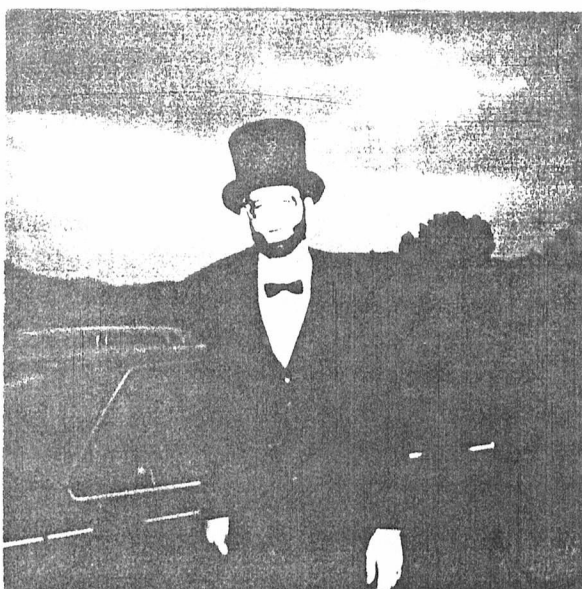
As a citizen, James served his cottage with distinction as the State Senator from Panhandle Cottage. Currently, James is a member of EMOCLEW, a social club for people with physical disabilities. If you will notice the name, it is WELCOME spelled backwards. He also attends Roney's Point Presbyterian Church.

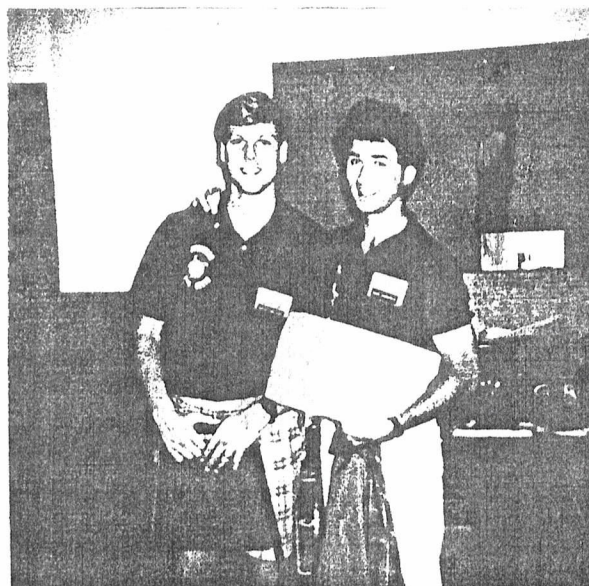

SPEAKERS OF THE DAY

PRESIDENT BUCKLEW SPEAKS TO CITIZENS

Accompanied by his attractive wife, Iona, Dr. Neil Bucklew, President of West Virginia University, spoke to the citizens of Boys' State at the Tuesday afternoon meal. Dr. Bucklew spoke with pride of Jackson's Mill, which is owned and operated by the Cooperative Extension Service of West Virginia University.

Dr. Bucklew's address centered on the theme of the development of one's potential. Stating that Boys' Staters obviously have potential, he encouraged the citizens to develop that potential in high school and college.

Bucklew cited three characteristics of students he has encountered at the University who have demonstrated the ability to develop their potential.

1. The joy of learning: These students "learn how to learn," which is far better than simply learning a lot of facts and figures. They take responsibility for continuing their education throughout their lives.
2. Participation: Students that know how to develop their potential participate in college life, whether in student government, the band, athletics, or other extracurriculars. They truly enjoy life and balance their social life with their academic responsibilities.
3. Standards: These same students also have standards that guide their lives, such as their commitment to family or service to others. They often give of themselves to others.

Dr. Bucklew congratulated the citizens on their high achievement, and he encouraged them to take home from Boys' State a desire to develop their potential, wherever that potential lies. He encouraged Boys' Staters to take a good look at state colleges, especially WVU.

"You're the caliber of men that we want at the University," he said.

MOUNTAINEER CAPTAIN COMES TO BOYS' STATE

Following Dr. Bucklew's talk at the Tuesday afternoon meal, WVU's Sports Information Director, Shelly Poe, was introduced. Along with Ms. Poe was Chris Haering, Senior Defensive Captain for the WVU Mountaineer Football team. Haering started in all twelve football games last season, including the Sunkist Fiesta Bowl. After a brief speech, Haering took several questions from the floor.

Questions ranged from the Mountaineers' schedule to the post-season playoff proposal for college football. Haering was especially well-received and remained afterwards for informal chats with Boys' Staters after lunch. Boys' State appreciates the time taken out of the busy schedules by the gang from WVU. R.A. THOM ADDRESSES CITIZENS AT EVENING ASSEMBLY

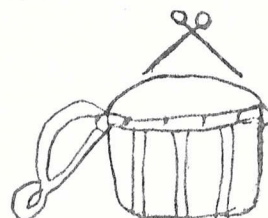

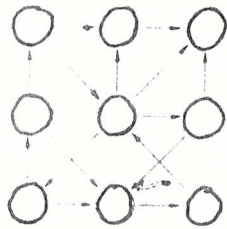

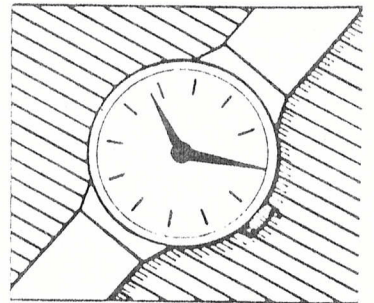
