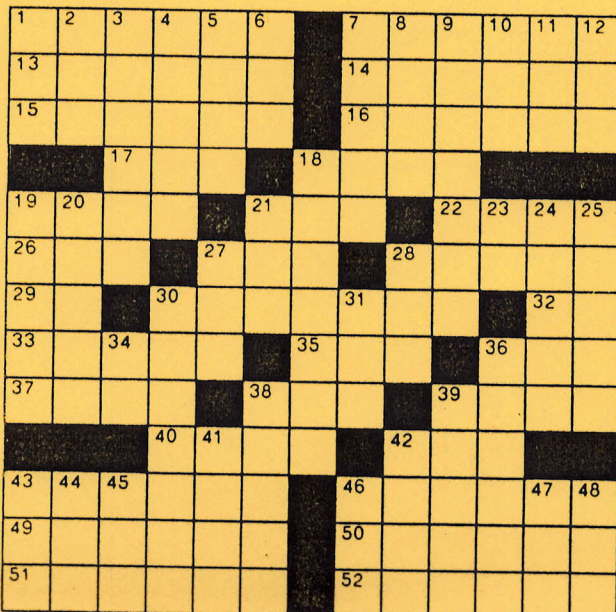

SENATE PRESIDENT LUNCHESES WITH CITIZENS

State Senate President Larry Tucker spoke to Boys' State following the afternoon meal. The audience was receptive to Sen. Tucker's anecdotes about athletics and the similarities of physical training and building leadership qualities. "It's time to get into shape," Tucker said, referring to the need for Americans to become more competitive with the rest of the world, especially the Western Europeans, Japanese, and Koreans.

Tucker cited the fact that over 1,000,000 high school students drop out in the United States every year. Tucker stressed the value of education for individuals and the sake of the nation in the years leading up to the 21st century and beyond. Having lost so many jobs to foreign firms, an educated workforce is needed to devise new strategies to compete in the world marketplace.

"This country is going to count on you to be smarter and faster than the competition," Sen. Tucker reminded the citizens. Boys' State appreciates Sen. Tucker taking time out from his pressing duties in Charleston and looks forward to future visit from this well-liked state leader.

AUDITOR GLEN GAINER ADDRESSES BOYS' STATE

Following the talk given by Sen. Tucker, one of West Virginia's most popular state leaders, Auditor Glen Gainer, addressed the citizens. Mr. Gainer's speech addressed the fact that West Virginia's youth are the state's most precious resource. Citing that West Virginia historically has been rich in natural resources like sand, lumber, and coal, Mr. Gainer explained that these are natural resources that we can afford to export.

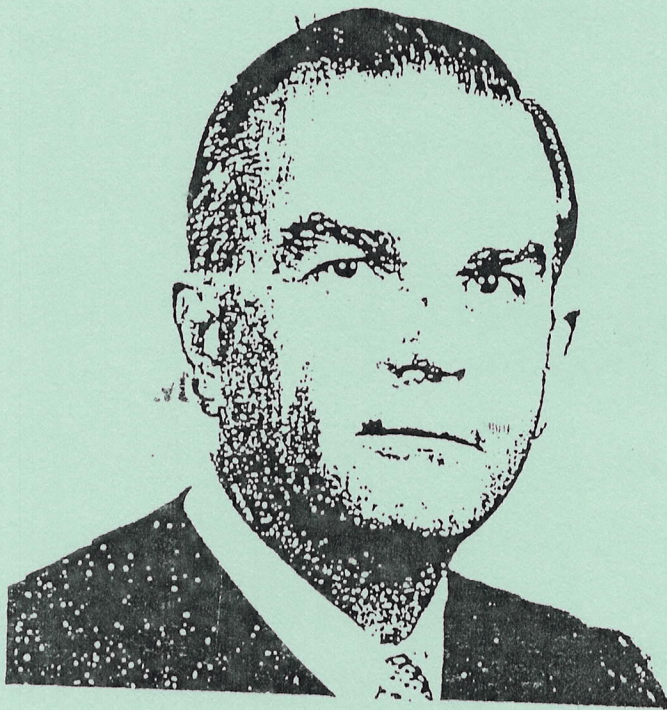
"But we can't afford to lose Boys' Staters," Mr. Gainer said.

Mr. Gainer reminded the citizens that West Virginia has the lowest crime rate in the nation, which is a credit to the state and its citizens. "I'm not for law (enforcement) by Louisville Slugger!" he said, in a reference to Justice Neely's Sunday speech.

Mr. Gainer called West Virginia "a great place to raise a family," and asked the citizens to give serious thought towards staying in West Virginia. A great friend of Boys' State, Glen Gainer is always welcome to Mountaineer Boys' State.

ROBERT EARL MAXWELL (D) of Elkins was born on March 15, 1924, the son of Earl L. Maxwell and Nellie E. Maxwell, educated in Randolph County Schools and Davis and Elkins College; J.L.B. College of Law, West Virginia University in 1949; married Ann Marie Grabowski in March, 1948; four children, Mary Ann, Carol Lynn, Ellen Lindsay and Earl Wilson; commenced private practice of law in Randolph County, June 1, 1949; member of Randolph County Bar Association; The West Virginia State Bar, the West Virginia Bar Association, American Bar Association and American Judicature Society; Catholic; elected Prosecuting Attorney of Randolph County in 1952, reelected 1956 and 1960; appointed United States Attorney for the Northern District of West Virginia by President Kennedy on March 15, 1961, resigned January 31, 1964 to return to private practice; elected Delegate to Democratic National Conventions in 1956 and 1964; appointed by President Johnson on July 19, 1965, as Judge of the United States District Court for the Northern District of West Virginia; Past Member, Budget Committee of the Judicial Conference of the United States; Former President, District Judges' Association, Fourth Circuit; 1969 recipient Alumni Distinguished Service Award from Davis and Elkins College; Appointed 1980 Judge, Temporary Emergency Court of Appeals
